Course Description:

Health Issues in the African American Community examines critical health issues that have long impacted this demographic, which has often suffered from disparities in health care. This course focuses on the combination of sciences, skills, and beliefs that are directed to the maintenance and improvement of the health of this population. Additionally, it provides a foundation of knowledge needed to interact with the information currently being published in the field. The course exposes the student to the interface in healthcare existing between the citizen, the healthcare problems, and the potential solutions. Understanding the process of developing practical solutions is an integral part of the process.

- 1. Appreciate, understand, and discuss the basis of health status in general and specifically as it relates to the African American community.
- 2. Begin to develop the tools in problem solving and team building necessary to address the issues presented in this course.
